1. In 2017/18 the Friess Lake and Richfield School Districts received and successfully implemented the following grants:

2. A Lego Robotics team was added at the middle school level and included interested students from both parent districts.
3. A mini music curriculum was implemented in kindergarten at Friess Lake and Plat last year that yielded an increase in student engagement and enthusiasm.
4. A spring Arts Showcase was held at Richfield Elementary School showcasing visual and performing arts.
5. Both Friess Lake School and Richfield Elementary School eighth graders participated in the HUHS WI Science Festival in November 2017.
6. Eighth graders in both parent districts attended the HUHS Homecoming Parade, helping to vertically link district and community spirit and pride.
7. For the first time ever, Richfield Elementary School had a student qualify for the National, National History Day Competition.
8. Friess Lake School District completed an Energy Efficiency project in the Spring, which included: addition of a HVAC monitoring system, destratification fans in the gym and library, retrofitting of all lighting indoors and outdoors to LED and building envelope sealing to control air leakage.
9. Friess Lake School hosted the Read to Rover program, and shared their resources with Richfield reading specialists who were able to subsequently add the READ Dog program at Richfield Elementary School.
10. Friess Lake School staff hosted a Brat Fry/Car Wash fundraiser to support Positive Behavior Interventions

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and Supports (PBIS) incentives.

11. In preparation for HHASD, the high school was contracted with to produce four editions of Ovations which provided the community with information about the approaching consolidated school district.
12. In preparation for the consolidated district, parent districts, Friess Lake and Richfield, together, hired a full-time music teacher versus hiring part-time teachers for each separate building.
13. Ms. Fedel and Ms. Harwood led staff from both parent districts in Google Apps training in June 2017.
14. Multiple Richfield staff were trained for Non-Violent Crisis Intervention.
15. Multiple students exited, or graduated, from the special education program; indicating growth and the achievement of individualized goals.
16. Richfield Elementary School made two major changes to the 2017/18 schedule which positively impacted teaching and learning. Block Scheduling was adopted for middle school English Language Arts and the middle school schedule was arranged so that teachers could focus on core content versus elective areas.
17. Richfield Parent Sounding Board meetings were increased from 3 to 5 per year, allowing for more frequent dialogue and communication loops. Friess Lake parents (and staff) participated in three of the five meetings in order to begin involvement for the consolidation.
18. Several Boy Scouts and Eagles Scouts performed long-term upkeep projects in order to maintain the Outdoor Classroom which enhanced the instruction of Friess Lake School students by retired educators in the school's Outdoor Classroom.
19. The Friess Lake School District celebrated the success of their fifth year of the Dolphin Kids After School program.
20. The Hartford Area Consortium collaborated to offer three joint professional development inservice days, revolving around unity, perception, belief in students, and content area supports and strategies, for all staff.
21. The Hartford Area Feeder Schools worked together in order to provide our teachers with high quality professional development surrounding Lucy Calkins Readers' Workshop for the fourth year in counting.
22. The Hartford Joint 1 School District sent two sets of teachers to visit Plat and Richfield Schools in October 2017 as Model Schools for Lucy Calkins Readers/Writers Workshop.
23. The Richfield School District collaborated to provide high-quality professional development in regard to Autism, Classroom Behavior/Management, ALICE
24. The School Board successfully remodeled Richfield Elementary School. The facilities work included roofing, windows, HVAC, RTUs, south wall tuckpointing, coining restoration, library carpeting, band room remodel, and Ms. Bauer's room remodel, many of which were energy efficiency projects.
25. Both parent school districts performed well on their School and District Report Cards.
